As you will have read in the President's Report above it has been a big few months for the COMCC. I have tried


to record the events in the Courier, but contributions from the members and their impressions are always welcome.

The V&V's Swap Meet was the first victim of the October spring weather having to be postponed because of the condition of the oval.

Monday 3 October V&V Display and Murraylands Rides

This year I opted for the Hills route to Mannum via Lobethal and Mt Torrens. I had a clear run and only needed to check the RAA map (what's a map, granddad?) once. The weather was mild and the Moto Guzzi made short work of the journey. I filled up at Mannum and saw the bikes beginning to arrive.

The display was being assembled on the river bank reserve, and bikes were being marshalled for the two rides. A good turn out and the V&V always have some interesting very old machines on display. I opted for the long ride and enjoyed a run along the open Murraylands roads. I spent most of the ride behind a BSA Victor with a Victorian number plate and it was probably the smallest bike on the run at 450cc. He kept up a good pace and out lasted a 650cc BSA which retired to the back-up trailer after the first ferry crossing. Returning to Mannum we had a bit of a wait for the ferry as last year, but it was a holiday weekend. COMCC was represented on the reserve with the gazebo and I had a chance to watch Charles' salesmanship as he moved the FOM caps and regalia. Alan Kernich and I left at the same time and headed back to Adelaide.





Tuesday 4 October Triumph Riders Club Run

The weather forecast for Ride Week (Rain Week) never looked good with the Triumph riders drawing a very short straw with 90% chance of 20mm of rain for their run to Birdwood. Ever optimistic and although it was raining when I left home, I thought it might 'blow over'. About 10 riders were ready to go when I got to Hazelwood Park and we headed to first stop at Lobethal. Despite the rain and wet road my 350 Triumph was running well, and I was enjoying the riding but not the amount of water my old waterproofs were shipping and thanked the ride leader Alan and headed for home and an early shower. I then settled down to watch a replay of the Thai MotoGP also run in the rain!





Wednesday 5 COMCC Club Barossa Ride

The school holidays made a noticeable difference to the morning traffic around 8 and 9 in the morning and I managed to make it to Civic Park in about 45mins including roadworks. This COMCC ride caters to sidecars, and I counted at least 5 outfits in the 30 plus starters. Cool but dry , a welcome change from yesterday's weather. Tony led the ride into the



We unfortunately fell foul of massive road works on South Road which took a while to get through. A good ride to a Myponga Reservoir regroup and then along the fast roads of Second Valley and lunch at Middleton. Perfect weather and spectacular views: great day.







Saturday 8 October Classics at Hart - Cavalcade

Things were well under way when Susan and I arrived at Harts Mill on the Matchless for the Cavalcade, Saturday morning. Club Patron Gary Johanson officially opened the event, and Club President Alan Kernich briefed the cavalcade riders.

An impressive group of machines representing the history of motorcycling turned in to Nile St. In all the excitement I had forgotten to turn on the petrol tap so ground to a halt around the first corner. This turned into a living history lesson illustrating how much easier it is to restart a modern bike in comparison to a 1952 500cc single while carrying a pillion. We caught up with the tail of the group on the other side of the Birkenhead Bridge and completed the tour in the company of Rob Elliot on his three-wheeler and the Savic electric motorcycle. The display (valued at \$3 million by somebody) was certainly impressive.

amounted to \$6,259.




























The Bay to Birdwood returned this year after 2021 Covid-related postponement. The organisers were claiming 1500 vehicles had registered for the 2022 event, and there were certainly a lot of cars on the West Beach Oval. According to the programme (now a PDF available on line) about a 100 bikes and outfits were entered. This would represent a

doubling of participants from the previous runs; however, I'm not sure they all showed up. I was on the run but in my car ('76 Alfetta GT and Susan in her '67 VW Beetle), so I wasn't watching the bikes assemble at the start for the whole time. I think I saw about half this number at the start, and at Birdwood many people don't enter the National Motor Museum, so it is hard to estimate numbers at the finish. The highlight of the assembled bikes was a contingent of Vincents. I have seen individual Vincents on the road before, but to see 10 outside of museum display is exceptional. They were all there: Black Prince, Rapides, a 1929 HRD, Comet, a Rapide with a Steil sidecar and even a Norvin. Progress was a bit slower this year as the route from Tea Tree Gully wasn't one way, but the passage through the city and suburbs was well managed and the crowds were out in force. We enjoyed walking around the cars and bikes in the warm sunshine before heading back to town. I think the event has yet to come up with a way to attract more bikes entries. The entry fee seems to a sticking point for some or perhaps the lack of a separate award for two and three wheelers. TJ

Incidentally, what had not been taken into consideration with our change of date was that it was also the day of the Meadows Fair and the streets were packed with visitors cars so the change of venue for morning tea was opportune.

After the lunch break at Mt. Barker, only four riders remained for the traditional afternoon ride to Melba's Chocolates at Woodside. Two of the four were not planning to return to Mt. Barker after Woodside, so the decision was made to abandon this section of the ride and end the tour for the day. Of interest was President Alan Kernich's participation, riding his 400cc Honda Four. Alan was the first President since Ken Hartland to participate in a Mopeds Plus event quite a few years ago. (*Ken's last term as President was 2010 - Ed.*).

Wayne Williams provided the back-up trailer with Alan Wallis as his assistant, should help have been needed. Sharon Cooper was due to ride pillion on the Zundapp but chose to follow in her car instead.

THE 50TH ANNIVERSARY WEEKEND **DISPLAY AND DINNER**

motorcycles on display. Many different countries and models were represented; their ages ranged from 1924 to 2006. On display was World Land Speed record Holder Shane Gaghan's Suzuki and two examples of the South Australian motorcycle - Tilbrook. Several hundred visitors came to look and admire the display.

The Mayor of Port Adelaide displayed his Motobi and also opened the display at noon on Saturday, arriving in the Police Historical Society's motorcycle and sidecar. Apart from celebrating our anniversary we also raised money for 'Care Beyond Cure', and we will be donating \$1300 to the organisation.

On Saturday night, 102 club members and dignitaries attend a celebratory dinner in the Pavilion opposite the display hall. The Pavilion was suitably decorated and special table trophies graced each table. The President welcomed all present and the CEO of 'Care Beyond Cure' explained the aims of the organisation. Members attending came from as far away as Warramboo and Yorktown. During the course of the evening, over \$400 was raised by the Lucky envelopes and auctions.

Over the weekend many old and past members came to admire the bikes on display. We were honoured by a visit from Ralph and Mary Datlen on Sunday afternoon. Ralph is the last remaining person of the original group which founded the Classic Owners Motor Cycle Cub in 1962. Many membership applications were requested by visitors to the display, a very encouraging sign. The raffle was drawn at 3.30pm and at 4 o'clock it was all over. It was a wonderful weekend and let us look forward to the 75th Anniversary as the club has a bright future.



CLUB REGISTRATION REGULATIONS

Historic Registration is now 'Club Registration'
Regulations Regarding Financial Membership and Club Registration

- Club Registration of a vehicle is conditional on the owner being a financial member of a registered car or motorcycle club. COMCC requires the vehicle must be inspected by a machine examiner, after which a log book will be issued. Club Registration is not transferable upon the sale of the vehicle.
- Vehicles must be over 30 years old (eg a bike manufactured in 1988 is eligible July 2018). Some modifications to historic vehicles are allowed for safety reasons check with the machine registrar.
- Regardless of your joining date, your membership renewal is due by the 30th June and if it is not paid by this date your vehicle is not registered and cannot be legally ridden on the road.
- It is your responsibility to ensure that your dues are paid by this date and that your Log Book is stamped for the current financial year.

The Club is obliged by law to inform the Motor Registration Department of any owners of Club registered vehicles who are not financial, (no longer members of the Club) and their Club registration is cancelled.

Members whose dues are not paid by the due date will be asked to re-join and pay the \$10 joining fee, unless the Committee considers that there are extenuating circumstances.

Lost Log Book Replacement

If a Log Book is lost or destroyed, a replacement can be issued by your authorising club only upon proof of the balance of 90 day's use in any year. It is suggested that you keep a separate record of events attended and other usage.


